10 Must-Have Skills to Be the Best Data Center Manager



Data Center Facilities Infrastructure and **Systems**

To manage a data center at the highest level, you need to have a deep understanding of the infrastructure and systems that data centers are comprised of and how they work together.

You should be familiar with:

- Server racks
- Servers
- Networking equipment (i.e., routers and switches)
- Storage equipment
- Power infrastructure (i.e., rack PDUs, busways, remote power panels, floor PDUs, branch circuits, UPSs, generators, fuel tanks, transformers, switchgear, switchboards, ATS, panelboards, DC plants, and DC bays)
- Environmental sensors (i.e., temperature, humidity, water, smoke, airflow, and air pressure)
- Structured, patch, and power distribution cabling
- Cooling equipment (i.e., CRACs/CRAHs, cooling towers, and
- Security equipment (i.e., electronic door locks and cameras for compliance with privacy laws such as the European Union's GDPR)
- Local building and construction codes
- Fire suppression systems
- Audits and reporting

Project Planning and Management

Data center projects can come in many forms such as migrations, consolidations, new site or cabinet buildouts, network connectivity installations, and hardware refreshes. However, no matter the project, the best data center managers have excellent project planning and management skills that give their projects a high success rate.

Project management skills you must have include:

- Fully understanding the requirements
- Developing a clear strategy
- Gaining maximum contribution from all staff
- Gaining buy-in from project stakeholders for maximum support
- Proactively managing risk by predicting potential negative outcomes and creating an action plan to prevent failure
- Completing projects on time, on budget, and to the highest quality

Many data center managers struggle to efficiently manage projects from creation to completion. Even the most experienced experts cannot avoid the pain of swivel chair interfaces. They need to copy and paste information between a multitude of spreadsheets, online forms, ticketing systems, and project management tools to keep projects moving and track their status. This process is manual and error-prone.

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
Data Analysis and Presentation

Modern data centers are packed with devices, meters, and sensors that generate a massive amount of data.

Gaining insights from this data provides a critical advantage that helps you maintain uptime and increase efficiency. However, many data center managers don't have the time or training to know how to collect that data, analyze it, and derive value from it. Outdated management tools like Excel and Visio are commonly used, but they are not designed for data centers and it's an arduous task to use them for data center analytics.

The best data center managers use second-generation DCIM software that features zero-configuration analytics. The software automatically collects, stores, trends, and reports on the data your devices generate and transforms that data into actionable insights such as when you are about to trip a circuit breaker and create potential downtime, where you may be running out of capacity or where you have additional stranded capacity, how well you are progressing towards sustainability goals, and the status of all work activity that is occurring in the data center.

Keeping your management and stakeholders aware of the latest status is important to demonstrate your progress on projects and easily make your case for purchasing more capacity. With 3D data center floor map reports and intuitive dashboard charts, DCIM software makes it easy to display your data center's health and capacity at a glance.

- Ensure all staff are trained on and using modern data center management tools
- Track the work activity in the data center by employee to ensure high productivity levels
- Coordinate the effort of various functional domains to ensure successful projects
- Get all team members to follow data center security policies and best
- Motivate team members to grow professionally

Managing people becomes easier when everyone has the same centralized view of all data center resources and follows the same documented processes. DCIM software provides clear port-level work orders to ensure that technicians always perform the job correctly the first time. Communication Skills

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
The best data center managers are not just technically proficient but have strong interpersonal and communication skills. Since data centers are complex ecosystems of interdependent components and systems, being able to communicate about them is a required skill.

You should be able to explain technical information in a clear and concise manner that is easy to understand by staff, customers, and management that do not possess the same technical knowledge.

You also need to effectively relay the policies, procedures, and regulations that your data center staff must follow to ensure that all rules are adhered to.

Act professionally with everyone you work with and be respectful and motivating to get the best productivity from your team and others.

To facilitate cross-functional communication. leverage a data center management solution that integrates with other tools to enable a single source of truth. Then, previously siloed tools and teams can share a centralized view of what's happening in the data center that enables data-driven collaboration

System Integration and Automation


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For many data center managers, their daily tasks require many tools and a lot of manual effort. This routine is time-consuming and prone to human error. It results in low productivity that causes delays, inefficient use of resources that wastes money, morale issues, and even costly downtime.

The best data center managers don't waste time entering the same data into multiple systems and don't worry about inaccurate data. Instead, they leverage "automation via integration."

Automation via integration is achieved by deploying and integrating modern DCIM software solutions with out-of-the-box connectors that automatically populate data in the appropriate systems. The benefits include enabling a single source of truth, improved workflow and productivity, and more cross-functional collaboration around shared data.

Leading data center managers integrate their DCIM software with a wide variety of other tools including CMDBs, ticketing systems, Dev Ops tools, and BMS systems. Their automation use cases include provisioning and orchestration, virtual machine management, parts and spares management, server power budgeting, automatically scheduled charts and reports via email, business rules, and automatic email alerts of power and environmental threshold violations.

Flexibility and Adaptability to Change

Data center management is constantly changing. New challenges are always appearing, but the best data center managers are able to quickly adapt to turn those challenges into opportunities to improve their operations.

For instance, COVID-19 caused a paradigm shift that required data centers to be managed remotely. Leading data center managers leveraged DCIM software to manage their data centers from home and reported that it was even better than being onsite.

Today, data center managers are under increased pressure to comply with corporate sustainability initiatives by intelligently reducing energy costs and increasing the efficiency of capacity utilization to get the most out of existing resources and defer costly new buildouts.

Yet there are still data center managers who rely on outdated tools and methods to monitor and manage their environments. Forward-thinking data center managers who adopt innovative solutions that enable them to make smarter decisions are gaining a massive competitive advantage.

For example, Comcast leverages Auto Power Budget, a DCIM software feature that automatically calculates an accurate power budget number for each server instance based on its actual measured load to get 40% more utilization out of their existing facilities. (Read the case study.)

Vendor Management

Many organizations outsource data center services such as colocation, managed hosting, remote hands, migration services, system integration, data center design and construction, and technical training. Outsourcing data center services provides data center managers the ability to scale quickly, avoid large capital expenses, and focus on more strategic projects.

As the demand for capacity continues to increase and organizations tighten their budgets, the amount of outsourced data center contracting is growing each year.

However, your data center is only as good as the people supporting it. The best data center managers have a thorough and documented prospective vendor vetting process that ensures that only the most qualified professionals have access to and responsibilities in their data center.

Mitigate risk by having vendors complete a competitive RFP process, ask for customer references, and read reviews and other material to gauge their industry reputation. Be sure to look beyond your immediate needs and include likely future requirements to find vendors that will be long-term partners as you grow.

Every data center is different, so once you have contracted with a vendor, be sure to provide the training, resources. and management support they need to be successful with your organization.

SLA Management

Service-level agreements (SLAs) sets clear and measurable guidelines, keeps goals aligned, and allows for recourse when obligations are not met.

Successful data center managers leverage SLAs as a way of specifying in exact terms what is an acceptable level of service from their providers. The service provider needs to meet the terms defined in the SLA or risk penalties. For example, colocation providers typically have SLAs that cover the availability of support, power, cooling, and network connectivity.

On the other hand, data center managers have internal or external customers that they have their own SLAs with. The best data center managers track important KPIs to ensure that they are meeting their end of the SLA.

By tracking how long it takes to implement a change from request to completion and monitoring how long each stage of a change takes, you'll have real data to compare against your SLAs. Should changes take too long in your data center, you can examine the data and identify why and in what stage the bottleneck is happening.

You should also track the number of change requests, tickets, and work orders, who is making them, what progress is being made, and what types of changes are being requested. This will ensure work order quality and transparency while improving staff efficiency through enhanced collaboration.

Common SLA metrics include uptime, response time, mean time to resolution, and customer satisfaction.

"We are the colo for the university. Anybody here at the university who's got a system can put their systems in. We've got to communicate with all our researchers on what's going on in their environments. If we see our central chill plant has a problem, thermal problems on equipment, or if anything starts to go awry, our DCIM is the center of the universe, but we need that tool to communicate proactively across the organization."

It is surprising that to this day, many data center managers—even those who are responsible for hundreds and thousands of cabinets of equipment—still use Excel, Visio, and homegrown databases to track and manage their data center assets.


These legacy management tools are time-consuming, inaccurate, difficult to maintain, and not designed to address the specific pain points of data center managers.


